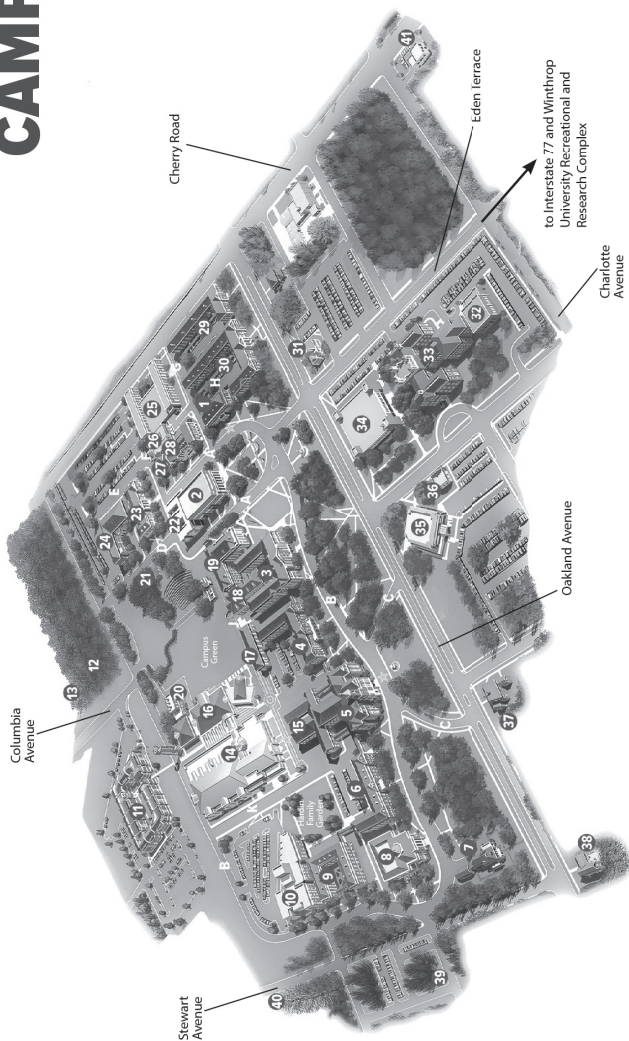

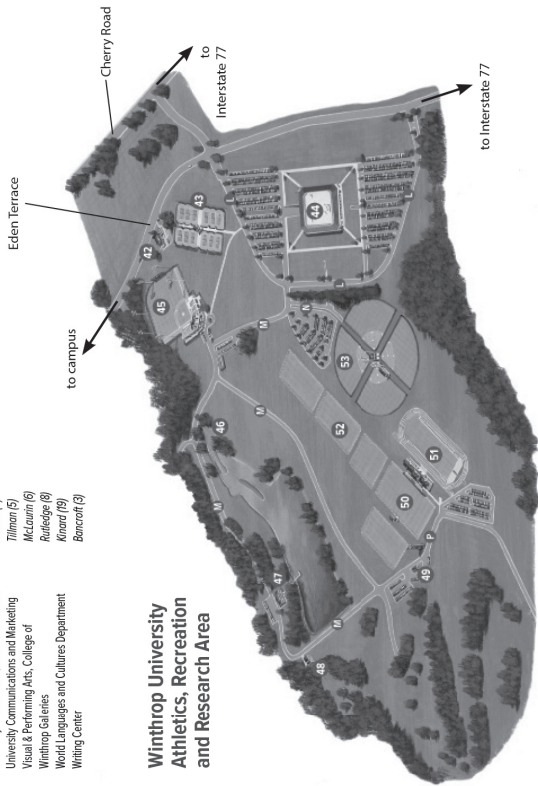

HIEYON CHOI

One of the most sought-after pianists of her generation, South Korean pianist HieYon Choi first appeared on the international piano music scene when she won prizes at high-profile competitions such as Kapell, Epinal, Busoni and Viotti. HieYon Choi has been since performing with prestigious orchestras of Europe, US and Korea such as das Rundfunkorchester Berlin, the National Symphony Orchestra (Washington DC), the Northern Sinfonia, the Seoul Philharmonic Orchestra and the Korean Broadcast Symphony Orchestra and appears as a soloist in festivals and concert series.

A milestone of Choi's performing career was the four-year long cycle of all 32 Beethoven piano sonatas at the Kumho Art Hall in Seoul. For this series she received the Arts Award of the year 2005 by the Korean Arts

& Cultural Association. Later she completed another Beethoven cycle with all piano trios, violin sonatas and works for cello and piano. Her second cycle of all Beethoven piano sonatas took place in various venues in Korea, Germany and the US until 2018. Choi's other series of performances include ones that explored Brahms and his associates and that of French school. She has been collaborating with renowned musicians such as Truls Mørk, Tsuyoshi Tsutsumi, Peter Stumph, Mark Kosower, Romain Guyot, Stephan Dohr, Ulf Wallin, Mikyung Lee, Soovin Kim.

Alongside the canon of the classical piano literature such as Beethoven, Schubert, Brahms and Debussy, Music of 20th & 21st century forms another important part of Choi's career. A strong advocate of the new music, she was the inaugural Artist-in-Residence of Tong-Yeong International Music festival. She performed works of Olivier Messiaen, György Kurtág, Sofia Gubaidulina, York Höller, Unsuk Chin, Sukki Kang a. o. with the Seoul Philharmonic.

Recently Choi completed her long journey of recording entire Beethoven piano sonatas. Her first two Beethoven albums were released in 2018 and in 2021 retrospectively by Decca Korea and UMG and they were highly noted by German and Korean magazine/papers. The entire set of Beethoven piano sonatas are to be released in the upcoming year. Her other recordings include <Debussy Douze Etudes>, <F. Liszt Six Grand Etudes on Paganini>, <Isang Yun 5 Stücke>, <Chopin Etudes Op. 10 & Op. 25>. Choi appeared and performed in TV & radio channels in Korea, US, Italy, Switzerland, Sweden and in Germany.

In 2023/24 HieYon Choi joined the piano faculty at Peabody Institute of the Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, US, after having served for 24 years as tenured piano professor at Seoul National University in Korea. Choi has been giving numerous master classes worldwide; the Guildhall School in London, Ecole Normale in Paris, Sibelius Academy in Helsinki, the Hochschule Freiburg, Karlsruhe, Düsseldorf in Germany, Music School of Manhattan, Cincinnati, Michigan in the US, Performing Arts Hong-Kong, China and in summer festivals in Italy, France, Korea and in the US. Choi also serves as a jury member at international competitions such as Beethoven, Maj Lind, Pozzoli, Epinal and Orléans.

Born in Incheon, South Korea, Choi gave her debut concert at the age of 6 with the Incheon Philharmonic Orchestra. She won all four most coveted competitions in Korea (Dong-A, Choong-Ang, Korea Times, Ehwa-KyungHyang) under the early tutelage of Prof. Joong-Won Koh and moved to Germany at the age of 18 to study with Prof. Klaus Hellwig at the Hochschule der Künste Berlin. The late Prof. Hans Leygraf at the same institute and the late Prof. György Sebök at Indiana University were further source of inspiration to her.

Carl Cunningham of The Houston Post described Gilmsen's playing as a "...brilliant, driving performance." Michael Huebner, of the Austin American-Statesman, referred to her performance of Bach's Goldberg Variations as "one of the most refreshing and thought-provoking performances this season." In 2001, she was awarded the prestigious Mount Everest Award by the Austin Critics Table for this performance, in which she played the Goldberg Variations on harpsichord and piano in the same evening. Michael Barnes, chief arts critic of the Austin

American-Statesman at that time, ranked this performance as one of the top ten arts events of 2001, calling it "unforgettable". In the celebration of its 20th anniversary, Austin's Performing Arts Center included this concert in the list of twenty most memorable programs of its history, one per year. Later, her studio recording of this performance received a Silver Medal from the Global Music Award. "I can now say that Sophia Gilmsen has gone where no one has gone before..." Fanfare Magazine

She is a recipient of numerous awards, among which are the First Prize in the Young Artists Competition in New York City, followed by a recital in Carnegie Hall, and the Piano International Recording Competition. Radio Leningrad, Radio Vatican, WQXR and WNYC in New York City, among others, broadcasted her performances.

Sophia Gilmsen is a dedicated educator. Her students have won major prizes on state, national, and international levels. Her unique pedagogical skills are universally recognized at both pre-college and collegiate levels.

She has received an array of excellence in teaching awards, including 2001 Collegiate Teaching Achievement Award of Texas. In 2023 she was inducted to the Steinway Teacher Hall of Fame.

Sophia Gilmsen is the co-founder of both Houston and Austin Young Artists Concerts, the programs designed for musically gifted children. Sophia has been an artistic director for both programs for twenty years since its inception in 1987 to 2007.

She presented papers, masterclasses and lectures at the World Piano Pedagogy and Music Teachers National Association Conferences as well as various international music festivals and conferences.

She has been published in Keyboard Companion, official journal of the Frances Clark Center for Keyboard Pedagogy.



Sophia Gilmsen graduated cum laude from the Leningrad (St. Petersburg) Conservatory in Russia, where she studied with a legendary Russian pianist Professor Vitaly Margulis. She is currently a Professor Emerita at the University of Texas Butler School of Music.

Dr. Irina Pevzner was born in Ukraine and raised in Latvia. After graduating from the Riga Jazep Medins Music College, she moved to the United States. Locally, she has performed at the Monday Night Concert Series, International Piano Series, Bishop Gadsden Concert Series, and Emily Remington Concerts. In addition, she is one of the core performers with Chamber Music Charleston.

Dr. Pevzner is currently the Executive Director of the Charleston Academy of Music, where she continues to teach piano while maintaining performance career. Her students there have been achieving success in local and national competitions year after year.



Tabitha Modrell is the Founder and Director of The Florence Music Academy in Florence, SC. After growing her own studio for multiple years, she founded The Academy in 2023, hiring additional instructors and support staff, and growing its student base to over 120 weekly students in under 2 years. MARINA AGREST

Marina Agrest started playing piano at the age of five in Leningrad (now St. Petersburg), Russia and by the tender age of six, she had her first public performance. Music was an integral part of Mrs. Agrest's life and provided a refuge during the turbulence of the Soviet Era. At the age of 7, Mrs. Agrest was accepted into the Preparatory Music School under the tutelage of Nina Alekseevna Dmitrieva, who was integral to her future success and guided her through Mrs. Agrest formative years. It was from her that Mrs. Agrest learned what makes a dedicated teacher, a teacher who gives 100% of herself to her students, and becomes like a parent to a student, by giving birth to a new musician.



Mrs. Agrest went on to receive Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance from the Rimsky-Korsakov College of Music, and then a Master of Music in Piano from the Rimsky-Korsakov State Conservatory.

Upon graduation, she went on to start her teaching career, she taught piano at St. Petersburg School of the Arts. There she also accompanied singers, violinists, dancers and performed solo. During her more than 60 years in music education, Mrs. Agrest taught hundreds of students. Her enthusiasm is making the difference in their lives. Her children also inherited her passion for music. They are both musicians as well. DR. MATTHEW MANWARREN

Pianist Matthew Manwarren is currently Professor of Piano at Winthrop University in Rock Hill, SC, a position he has held since 2006. He has also served as Professor of Piano at Belmont University in Nashville, TN, and at Erskine College, where he held the prestigious Harriet Pressly Smith Caldwell Professorship in Music. From 2018-2022, Dr. Manwarren served as a Visiting Professor of Piano at the School of Music, University of South Carolina. From 1998-2024, Dr. Manwarren served during the summers on the faculty at the prestigious Adamant Music School in Vermont, where he was the Artistic/Executive Director from 2021-2024.

Dr. Manwarren has established a notable reputation as a solo and collaborative performer. He has given recitals and masterclasses at numerous venues, including Weill Hall at Carnegie Hall in New York, universities throughout the U.S., numerous concert series, and music organizations throughout the US and abroad. As a chamber musician, he has collaborated on several occasions with the Rhodora Winds, the principal woodwind quintet of the Charlotte Symphony. He has also given art song recitals with soprano Kristen Wunderlich and tenor Jeffrey Price. Dr. Manwarren collaborates frequently with South-African pianist, Franklin Larey. They have given numerous recitals of the entire duo piano and piano four-hands works of Francis Poulenc. His recording, entitled *Youthful Passion and Fantasy*, featuring Schumann's *Fantasy in C Major, Op. 17* and Brahms' *Sonata No. 3 in F minor, Op. 5*, was released on the Americus label in 2015. In 2023, he recorded the entire piano works of composer Leonard Mark Lewis, all works which were commissions by Dr. Manwarren.

Dr. Manwarren began his piano studies with Mary Lou Hindman Wade in El Paso and later studied with Claude Herndon (a pupil of Tobias Matthay). He earned his undergraduate degree (*summa cum laude*) from Texas Tech University as a student of William Westney. While there, he received the prestigious Eva Browning Piano Scholarship and was winner of the university concerto competition, performing with the Texas Tech University Symphony. He earned his master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, studying piano with Frank Weinstock and Elisabeth Pridonoff and organ with David Mulbury. In 1996, Dr. Manwarren was awarded a Teacher Enrichment Grant from the Music Teachers National Association for the purpose of studying at the French Piano Institute in Paris, where he had the opportunity to coach with Dominique Merlet, Pascal Devoyon, and Noel Lee. Dr. Manwarren has coached with Virginia Hutchings of Atlanta, Walter Hautzig of New York City, and John O'Connor of the Royal Irish Academy of Music. He has also worked with Sheila Paige, coordinator of the Piano Wellness Seminar, where he has had the opportunity to study pianistic technique, ease, and movement at the piano that prevents injury for the pianist.

Dr. Manwarren has served two terms as president of the South Carolina Music Teachers Association. In 2018, he was named the SCMTA Outstanding Teacher of the Year in recognition of his teaching and service to SCMTA. In 2025 he was named as an MTNA Foundation Fellow by SCMTA and will be honored at the 2026 MTNA Conference in Chicago. His students have gone on to have professional careers as performers and teachers throughout the country and abroad.

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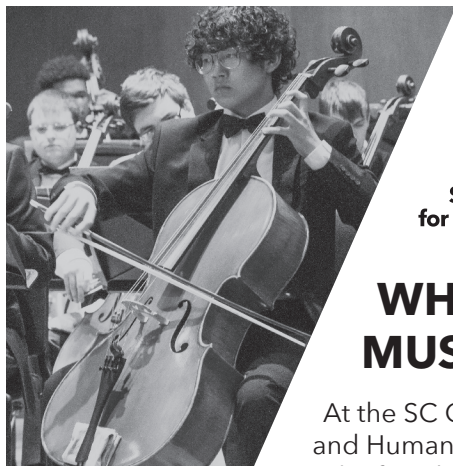
